Cristo Rey Brooklyn (CRB) is a Catholic high school partnering with families of all creeds to educate deserving young people from underserved communities to become men and women of faith, purpose and service. By integrating a rigorous curriculum, a unique work-study experience and the support of an inclusive school community, we enable students to succeed in college and beyond with the values essential to a fulfilling life.

Cristo Rey Brooklyn High School alumni will be recognized as lifelong learners, inspirational community and professional leaders, and committed to a purpose beyond self.

A Brief Overview of Cristo Rey Brooklyn High School

CRB is one of the 41 schools in the nationally recognized Cristo Rey Network, and endorsed by the Sisters of Mercy. In 2018, CRB achieved accreditation from the prestigious New York State Association of Independent Schools (NYSAIS), an organization of nearly 200 leading private schools that aims to promote the well-being of New York's independent schools. Since its establishment in the fall of 2008 with an initial class of 43 students, CRB's enrollment has grown over five times that number, drawing young men and women from various neighborhoods and middle schools across New York City. We are incredibly proud to have a large and diverse community of alumni, consisting of over 700 individuals who have completed our distinctive Cristo Rey program of study.

Corporate Work Study (CWS)

The Cristo Rey Brooklyn **Corporate Work Study (CWS)** program is fundamental to its educational mission and model and serves vital to any Cristo Rey school's financial sustainability. Every student enrolled at Cristo Rey Brooklyn attends classes four days a week and works one day a week, from September through June, during all four years of high school. The Corporate Work Study program functions like an employment agency. Our students are employed by the Cristo Rey Brooklyn Corporate Work Study program, not by our corporate partners. CWS is certified by the Federal Department of Labor and operates as a separate legal entity from the high school. Students are typically assigned to work study partners in four person teams at an all-in cost of \$40,000. CWS issues I-9s and liability insurance. The money is divided equally among the students of the team to cover roughly 50% of each student's educational costs. Participation in this program enables students to acquire essential work-related skills, gain exposure to potential career options, develop a strong work ethic outside of school, and build an enduring self-confidence.

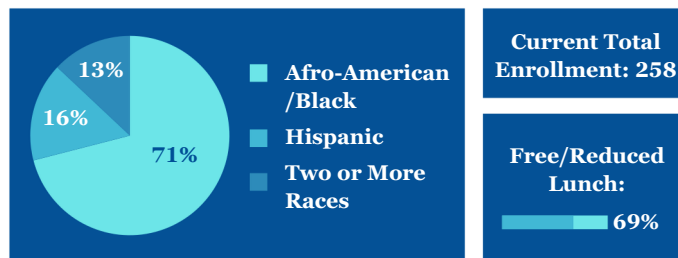
The Grade Point Average (GPA) of students is computed according to the following scale:
